Jan has successfully completed her owl stitched on acetate. Her grandson thought she had bought it; he was amazed at his grandma's skill!






At the December meeting we all began our Christmas decoration, using a cotton reel as the base and many of the sparkly, colourful, odds and ends, we have in the cupboard.

The Art of Japanese Stitching. 6th January 2024. 2 to 4pm. Led by Serena



Serena will talk about the history of Sashiko embroidery, which is fascinating, then add a few tips on how to get a consistent stitch and the symbolism behind the patterns. We will stitch on pre-printed fabric with the Sashiko threads. You will be able to turn the finished work into anything you like. There will be options as to the size and complexity of your chosen design.



The session will be used to practice the actual embroidery. It isn't difficult but there is a special technique, which Serena will demonstrate and assist us with.

She will also talk about boro stitching and bring along some finished items to inspire us.

Sashiko is traditionally stitched with white thread on indigo dyed cotton.

The necessary pre-printed fabric and Sashiko thread will be provided but there will be a charge of £1.00 for the special Sashiko needles. These needles are especially sharp, long and even. Sashiko stitching is based on an easy running stitch but uses a different technique to the usual embroidery stitches.

Please bring your usual sewing kit, including embroidery scissors.
